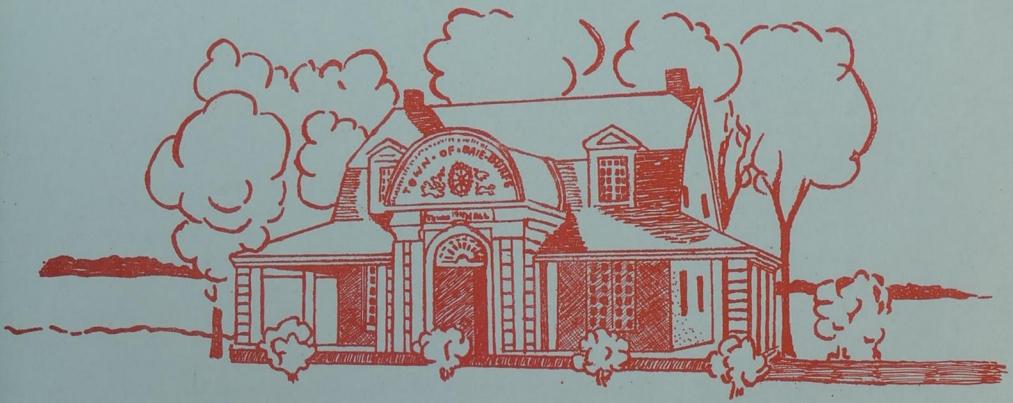

SCHOOL AFFAIRS

Several Members of the School Affairs Committee attended a meeting of the School Trustees called for the purpose of preparing the budget to present to the Central School Board.

The Trustees decided to present this budget with the same figures as used last year, with the exception that both Bus Drivers (Baie D'Urfe and Ste.Marie Rd.) and the Secretary-Treasurer demanded increased salaries.

It was pointed out by Mr. Wm. Spriggs that the Central School Board will decide whether or not these increases be granted. The question arises - where are these demands for increases going to lead us. They are the second demands within the short period that the Citizens' Association has been attending School Trustees Meetings.

Although money has been saved out of the Taxes the actual years expenditure runs very close to the annual income and sometimes exceeds it. In other words WE CANNOT AFFORD TO PAY THESE DEMANDS. We are already expecting to pay higher School taxes this year and in the future to help carry the costs of operating Macdonald School under the new regime.

A meeting of the Macdonald Central School Board was held on Friday August 20th. One representative attended from Baie D'Urfe. There was little new ground covered as Mr. W. Long had not yet prepared the agreement owing to the fact that those who can give him most accurate information are away on holiday.

It was expected that the final work on this agreement will be completed shortly. Mr. Angus gave an informal talk on his meeting with Mr. Dobell (McGill's representative) and was favourably impressed that everything possible will be done to iron our difficulties.

The Board has been given the opportunity to study the books showing McGill's methods for calculating the cost of heating and servicing the present High School. It was approved that \$80.00 per year or \$8.00 each month for 10 months, be the fee to be charged for a child of Catholic Faith if the father was also Catholic and the same fee for a child outside our own municipalities.

It was also proposed that the same Auditors audit the accounts of all Local Boards and Central Board, and P.S. Ross & Sons were appointed. Mr. Butler reported that nothing further had been heard from Pointe Claire.

The meeting closed early and those few members of the Public present were given the opportunity to discuss matters with board members and ask any questions. It is expected that the budget for the coming year will be ready for the next meeting on the 3rd Friday in September.

The West end of Lake St.Louis, off Baie D'Urfe and Beaurepaire provided those interested in Sailing with a beautiful spectacle on the afternoon of August 21st, the occasion being the annual Baie D'Urfe - Beaurepaire Sailing Regatta.

The weather was fine and warm, the wind light and the record number of starters (about 95 of all classes) had difficulty in finishing the shortened course within the time limit.

The westerly buoy was located quite close to the Town Hall and from the grounds a fine view of the first leg of the course could be obtained. The racing fleet comprised all types and classes - the fast 14 foot sloop rigged dinghies and their cousins the gaff rigged cat dinghies, the A and cruising class in which the stately Mirage-biggest boat in the fleet - took part - the D class of 32 to 35 foot cabin sloops and yawls, the 27 foot E class sloops and the three one design classes - the F's, PC's and Y's 21 ft., 19 ft., 18 ft. long respectively, the Miscellaneous and the Small open Boat class.

Feature event of the Regatta is always the Handicap Race for the Ishkoodah Cup and one of the smaller boats sailed an outstanding race to win the Trophy handily. This was the PC class sloop REBEL, owned and sailed by A.G.Currie of Pointe Claire Y.C. Rebel, being small, gets handicap from Mirage, Le Cygne the E's but she did not need this handicap since her time for the course was the fastest of all the Yachts.
