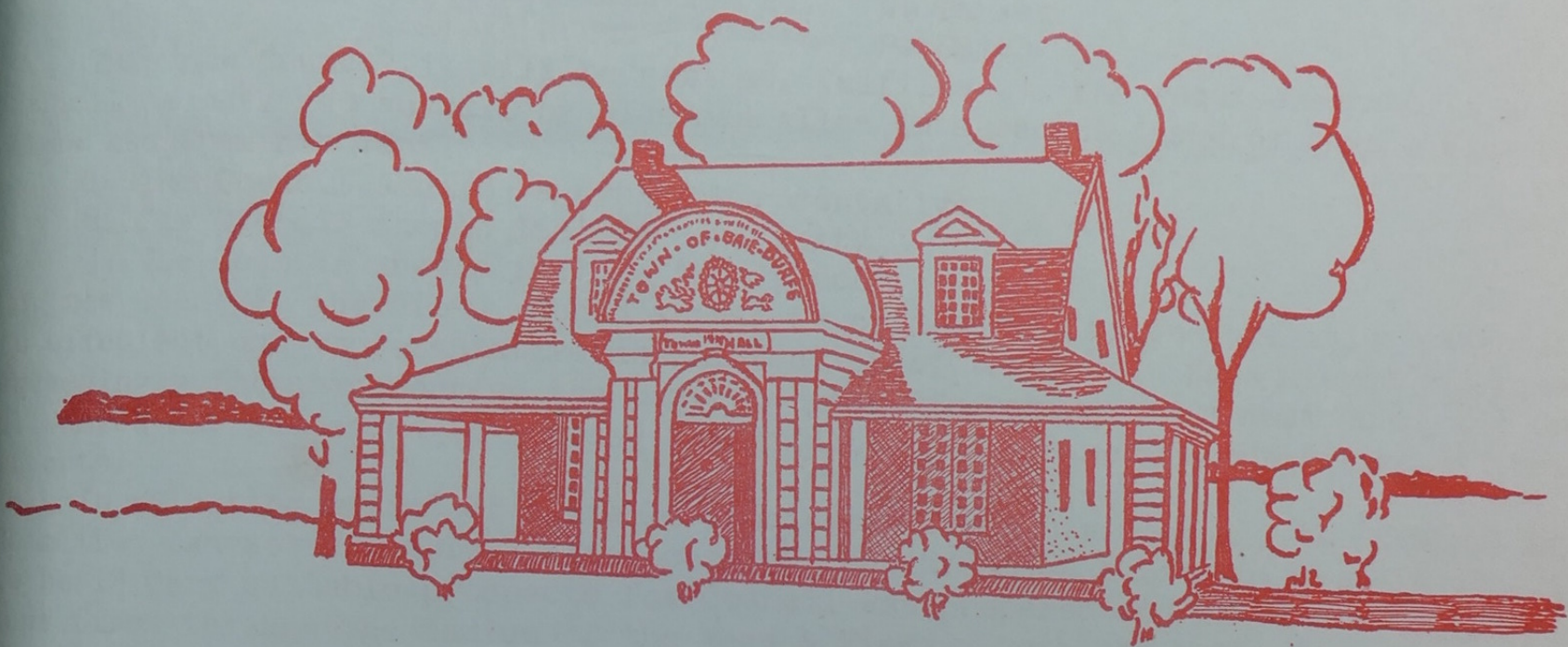

This new Council, it will be noticed, fulfills all the requirements of a model Council as outlined so well by Alderman Allan in a recent issue of News & Views. These requirements were:

1. The Council should be truly representative
2. The Council should include continuity
3. The Council should include "New Blood".

Our new Council, therefore, would appear to possess all of the qualities essential to efficient and representative administration of the Town. Baie d'Urfe has been exceedingly fortunate during the past two years in having had a most energetic Council which has succeeded in getting things done. We are most appreciative of their efforts.

In selecting a list of suitable candidates for a new Council, the Nominating Committee canvassed widely. After careful consideration a list of what it considered to be 12 very suitable prospects for Council was prepared and presented to the citizens first through the medium of the News & Views. Both the Nominating Committee and your Executive were very anxious to make our new Council truly representative. For this reason at the time of publishing the list of candidates all citizens were invited to submit any additional nominations to the committee on or before June 10th, the day of the regular June meeting.

Since additional names were not received by June 10th your executive considered that the list of candidates submitted met with the entire satisfaction of the Association.

On June 10th a very well attended meeting selected from 12 candidates its slate of six aldermen through the medium of a secret ballot.

I am sure you will agree that every possible effort was made to enlist the interest and support of every member of the Citizens' Association in selecting, entirely democratically, a truly representative Council. I am sure you will join with me in congratulating our new Council on their election, in wishing them every success and in providing them with your whole hearted support in their work throughout the next two years.

T H E R E C O R D

The following summarizes the monthly meeting which was held at the Town Hall on June 10th. Dr. Cruickshank reported from the Council meeting that Mr. Spriggs would contact the Quebec Hydro concerning the lights still needed on Lakeview Road. He also stated that he had hopes of something definite being done about the soot nuisance from the College Power House. Dr. Hanson reported that he would be inspecting a piano which would be well within our budget during the weekend. A vote of thanks was extended to the Auction Sale committee for the success of the sale which was expected to bring in approximately \$150.00 profit for the Association. It was announced that the Council would cut all weeds and grass along the edges of roads and residents are now reminded that it is a law that all weeds must be controlled and it is the responsibility of every property owner to see that his property is free of weeds. Arrangements are being made for all chimneys to be swept during the month of August. This is compulsory by a Town By-law. The charge will be \$1.00 per flue to be paid on the spot. A receipt will be given and one man will enter the house to ensure a proper job being done. Every householder must, therefore, make suitable arrangements for the visit of the sweep during that month. Mr. Laird read his correspondence with the Postal authorities regarding postal delivery, showing that our district is not yet large enough for this service. Announcement was made by Mrs. Gray regarding plans for the presentation of the Honour Roll on Sunday, June 26th at 3:15 p.m. The matter of speeding was again brought up and it was decided to ask the Council to place

proper signs through the Town. Mrs. Laird announced the plans for the meeting to be held on Monday, July 4th, at the Town Hall for the purpose of electing a new trustee. Mr. Harry Smythe was proposed and unanimously accepted by the meeting. Everybody was strongly urged to attend this meeting and cast their vote if an election becomes necessary. The treasurer made a statement regarding the finances. Mr. Poe announced plans for sailing. After all this business, the chairman asked Mr. Case to tell the meeting briefly the responsibilities of the Town Councillors, after which Mr. Pilkey introduced the men whose names were on the proposed list, each one saying a few words. Six names were then selected by ballot, this slate to be presented on nomination day as the nominations of the Citizens' Association. The meeting then adjourned and tea was served.

BAIE D'URFE DAY

The big day for everybody this month will be Baie d'Urfe Day on Saturday, July 16th. The committee is planning a grand programme from 9:30 a.m. till 5:30 p.m. During the morning land races will be organized for the children and plenty of fun to keep them occupied till 11:45. Then home to dinner and perhaps a little rest. Any families wishing to make a day of it are welcome to eat their picnic lunch on the grounds, provided that parents are with the children and all garbage removed. At 2:30 the water sports will start with swimming races for boys and girls up to 50 years of age and old ladies and gentlemen over 50. These will naturally be divided up into suitable groups. Plenty of canoe and rowing races will be followed by a grand Fancy Dress March. Then follows several amusing land races for those over 13 years, with a presentation of prizes at 5:30 p.m. From 4:30 onwards, tea, fruit drinks and ice cream will be served free. Everybody bring a little package of solid nourishment to go with the drinks. Make it your supper if you like. Soft drinks will be on sale all day for the extra thirsty ones. All residents of Baie d'Urfe are invited to take part, so come to the Town Hall on Saturday, July 16th, prepared to have a good time. PRIZES FOR ALL EVENTS.
