

TOWN PLANNING

We reserved space in this issue for our report on a joint meeting which was to have been held with a committee of the Town Council. Such meetings are hard to arrange at any time, but during the Summer months really present a problem. However, it seems safe to promise that our report will appear in the next issue of this paper.

Our principle objectives at the meeting will be to establish that the Building Committee of the Town Council should be given the authority to refuse a building permit if in their opinion a proposed structure would for any

reason devaluate adjacent property.

We should also recommend that the Building Committee be enlarged and that an advisory board be appointed to assist the committee in administrating the discretionary authority which we are recommending.

THE RECORD

The regular monthly meeting of the Association was held at the Town Hall on June 11th. Citizens expressed their appreciation for the action taken by Mr. Richard Angus in changing the time of the Central School Borad meeting so as not to conflict with that of the Association. Mr. Nagley will remind Committee Chairmen that adequate publicity should be given their programs before and after they are put on. Council will post notices at the Town Hall regarding the building by-laws.

Mr. Robertson will not be able to sell Money Orders as previously thought since some type of bond has to be posted. Treasurer reported a very favourable balance sheet with an additional sum of \$68.20 being derived from the Auction Sale. Miss Kruse has a copy of the Noxious Weeds Act listing the different types involved. Copies are available for those who want them, also she has information regarding the effect of grass fire on the soil which will be found elsewhere in this issue.

A letter of resignation received from Mr. DeWitt, Chairman of the Horticultural Committee was read. Mrs. Gray reported the names of two prospective members as well as mentioning that renewals are still coming in. Bob McBride has formulated some plans in regard to swimming facilities at the Town Hall which will be made known shortly. Executive Committee was authorized to spend up to \$100.00 including the \$53.00 already authorized to improve these facilities.

Town Planning Committee have drawn up a further letter to Mr. Case regarding the proposed amendment to the building by-laws. Meeting supported Mr. Williamson for re-election as a school trustee in the forthcoming school board elections. Mr. Holliday was installed as Chairman of the newly formed Welfare Committee and with Messrs. Turnau, Vauthier, Vidler, Parker and Mrs. Brown was ready to start canvassing the Town in connection with the new Lachine General Hospital fund. Mr. Pennefather was granted permission to have C.I.L. carry out experimental work in the removal of water weeds. Mr. Smythe reported the Auction Sale a great success with \$68.20 having been realized. It was decided that the scheme for the drainage of the College Green in accordance with Prof. Heimpel's scheme be taken to the Council for possible action. Mr. Vauthier suggested that the Association allow the people who have the fire fighting equipment, previously mentioned to stage a free demonstration at some later date. Further action in this connection will be taken up by the Executive Committee.

WELFARE COMMITTEE -

Phil Holliday, Chairman - The first job this new Committee undertook to do was the canvassing of Baie D'Urfe for the Lachine General Hospital's new building appeal.

FACT FINDING -

As we are interested at the present time in the elimination of noxious weeds, it may be of interest to our members to know which plants are considered noxious by the Quebec Noxious Weeds Act. We have received the list of names and anyone interested may obtain the list by applying to the Fact Finding Committee - Frida Kruse - Phone 2459 - We have also been asked for the facts concerning the effect of grass fires on the fertility of the soil and have received a letter from the Department of Agriculture which we quote - "Usually burning off of dead grass and refuse on mineral soils has little or no effect on the soil tilth. On muck soils or soils high in organic matter, the fire sometimes gets into the soil itself and actually burns the organic matter. Under these circumstances considerable damage might be done. Burning the grass on mineral soils might only affect the organic matter as it normally would be if burning was not done. We have checked on grass production from the standpoint of pasture and find that the production is not quite as high on areas which have been burned over as it is where no burning is done. We do not favour burning grass. Not only does it do no good from production standpoint but there is always the danger of a grass fire getting out of hand and causing damage. The only advantage is that it serves to burn up any weeds or similar refuse left from the previous year and makes the area less unsightly at least temporarily." Signed - P. O. ISSUE 13 JULY 1948 -

CENTRAL SCHOOL BOARD

A meeting of the New Protestant Central School Board was held at Macdonald High School on Friday June 18th. at 8:30 P.M. All members of the board with the exception of Mr. Farmer were present. Dean Laird and Mr. Davies sat amongst the Public, very few of whom attended the meeting.

It is unfortunate that tax payers in general take so little interest in School Affairs, especially when this New Board has undertaken the formidable task of making entirely new arrangements for managing the only School in this district and will shortly be discussing the problem of Finance which will affect all of us.

The Central Board does not take over the School until July 1st. but in the meantime has to make a satisfactory and binding agreement with McGill University. Mr. Spriggs and Mr. Butler were appointed a Committee to meet with Mr. J. W. Long as Legal adviser to draw up this agreement.

Mr. Farmer and Mr. Butler were appointed a Committee to keep in touch with the Head Master and place his recommendations before the board - this Com-

mittee to change each year.

It was stated that the Teachers at the School would no longer be on the Pay Roll of McGill University after 1st of September 1948. The matter of Pension and Group Insurance was discussed but these matters had to be studied further.

Dean Laird and Mr. Davies were consulted from time to time by the Chairman (Mr. Richard Angus) and Dean Laird stressed the point that plans for the School would have to be prepared with an approximate price before the Department of Education would make any definite statement with regard to the size of the Grant.

Mr. Butler gave a resume of the talks with Pointe Claire and other Lakeshore Districts and stated that nothing had been agreed upon as these districts were still not in agreement amongst themselves.

It was definitely understood by those present at the meeting on Friday

that the Province would only give the largest possible grant if the School was used by the School for Teachers for practice teaching.

The Chairman allowed an open discussion after the business meeting. As the work of this Central Board progresses this open discussion will give us an excellent chance to keep in close touch with the problems facing the board and to express our own viewpoint.

Meetings are held every 3rd. Friday of the month at 8:30 P.M. in "ac-

SUPPLEMENT PROGRAMME

Under the second heading answers were given on such questions as to women on school boards, authority of board, outside pupils, demonstration and practice teaching, etc.

While all this information proved of value, it is to be hoped that a second programme will be arranged which will go into the matter of what cons-

titutes good education.
